Admiral Bell:

Sea ice monitoring via remote controlled cameras strategically placed throughout upper Cook Inlet.

Programs that provide a wide array of stakeholders with valuable information regarding the Cook Inlet such as shoreline mapping, species identification and extensive ocean current studies.

Constructive relationships with all state agencies and industry stakeholders regarding review and development of oil spill contingency plans.

Local scholarship program that awards \$2500.00 scholarships to area students who plan to pursue studies in maritime studies and environmental sciences.
