## Admiral Dean:

This letter is being written in full support of recertification of the Cook Inlet Regional Citizens Advisory Council (CIRCAC). I have been associated in one manner or another with this organization for the entirety of its 33-year existence. I, along with Mayor Gilman of the Kenai Peninsula Borough and others, traveled to Washington, D.C. to request the development of CIRCAC as it was established under OPA 90. From that time to the present, I served 18 years as Mayor of the City of Kenai, three years as Mayor of the Kenai Peninsula Borough, and 12 years as a representative of the City of Kenai on the CIRCAC Board of Directors, including nine years as its President. My knowledge and understanding of the mission of CIRCAC has grown as has the organization over those years. - · Received study plan approval from BOEM for data needs for model validation in Cook Inlet

- · Increased public outreach efforts through new, local advertising, exhibits and expanding audiences for its newsletter, website, and social media
- · Expanded Geographic Response Information Database (GRID) in scope and accessibility

- · Participated on and provide expertise to the Cook Inlet Harbor Safety Committee
- · Expanded the Cook Inlet Ice Monitoring Camera Network with modern video technology
- · Local scholarship program that awards (3) \$2,500 scholarships to area students who plan to pursue studies in maritime studies and environmental sciences.
